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FIXING STATE FOOTBALL

I am a dinosaur, or at least I feel like one after last Saturday's State Game between the SANFL and NEAFL North.

You see I still care for state footy and look forward to the big red jumper taking the stage each year regardless of venue and opponent.

Alas after just 1,498 turned up to City Mazda Stadium last Saturday I am a member of an ever dwindling minority.

Not only was it the smallest crowd of the SANFL season and the smallest crowd ever at a state game in SA it was the flatness of the atmosphere that struck home hard.

There are a few other thoughts on the state game in this issue but for this piece I wanted to suggest some changes going forward.

Firstly state football, supported or not, has a future with the schedule of opponents set for the next 4 seasons until 2017.

Indeed the next two games against the VFL and WAFL are on the road.

In 2016 we are set to host NEAFL East (NSW/ACT) and unless things radically change it looms as an even bigger mismatch than the Northern Conference.

Surely the lesson from Saturday is that it is better for this game to be played in Sydney or

Canberra than in SA.

The best state league in the country coming to town would be a good draw card for the NEAFL to promote within it's community where as we have already sampled that local interest in such a matchup is almost non existent here in SA.

That takes us to 2017 and the visit of the VFL.

This will be the SANFL's 140th anniversary, our arch-rivals bringing state footy back to SA for the first time in four seasons.

Surely in that time a worthy promotional plan can be implemented to ensure a decent crowd.

As an example why not have a \$1-\$2 levy on season and home match tickets for the seasons leading into the game so these loyal supporters of the SANFL get FREE entry on the day.

If, after all this, we still can't get a crowd then like the dinosaurs, state footy would be is dead.

execute an Andy Collins game style now more focused on kicking a winning score.



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

The Bloods are sitting on top of


the table, playing some very attractive football, while the Redlegs have had a couple of hiccups but still sit second.
